❖ Vine at Home Service

Along with this newsletter, there should also be a separate attachment called 'Service 1 (Vine)'. This is a short service that can be used at home and includes prayers, a reflection and songs (that can be played via the embedded YouTube links).

❖ Methodist Church in Britain Worship at Home

Along with this newsletter, there should also be a separate attachment called 'Service 2 (Methodist)'. This is a short service that can be used at home and includes prayers, a reflection and a song (that can be played via the embedded YouTube link).

'When I Can't Get to Church'

Along with this newsletter, there should also be a separate attachment called 'Service 3 (Salesian)'. This is a short, standard service that can include a number of people in a household, or by connecting with others over video conferencing etc.


Wesley's Chapel Livestream

❖ Weekly Offertory

As you may be aware, the offertory was already behind budget when the Wesley Hall building was closed, meaning that we are not currently able to meet for worship. This closure is likely to have a big impact on our finances, so if you are able to continue (or begin) to give to Wesley Hall, then that would be really helpful. The main thing that our offertory goes towards is the Circuit Assessment that is then used to run the Circuit and pay our Ministers. With our buildings closed, our Minsters are busy supporting our congregations in new and different ways, so are still working and still need paying!

If you are able to continue to give, here are a few options below:

- Post a cheque with your offering to Wesley Hall, either using the postal system or by dropping it
 into the post box next to the main entrance if you are out for a walk and passing. This can be
 done weekly, fortnightly, or as often as you like.
- Make a bank transfer to Wesley Hall. You do not have to set up a standing order, but could make a one-off transfer each week, each fortnight or as often as you like. You can then return to using your envelopes when Wesley Hall is again open for worship.
- Continue to put money in your weekly offering envelope as normal, and then save them to put in the offering when Wesley Hall is again open for worship.

❖ The Lord's Prayer

Godliness is next to cleanliness, two of nation's two most senior clerics have suggested, and are urging the public to say the Lord's Prayer when they wash their hands as part of the national call to prayer to beat coronavirus. The Archbishops of Canterbury and York suggest that reciting the prayer should be part of people's hygiene routine, pointing out that it takes longer than the 20 seconds recommended to wash hands thoroughly.

Not surprisingly, Christian Aid has had to cancel the usual house-to-house street collections that take place in May as part of Christian Aid Week. Christian Aid is a charity that seeks to help individuals and families around the world overcome poverty and injustice. Christian Aid Week forms a big part of their funding raising each year and so will be a big loss and impact the financial assistance they can give to overseas projects helping the poor. The focus for this year's fundraising is to help with the impact of climate change on the poor. For example, droughts are now more frequent and intense in places such as Kenya due to the climate crisis, and funds raised could help a community build an earth dam so that when the rains come, they have the water they need to live. Hopefully as a church we can have a collection for Christian Aid once we are meeting again.
