❖ Wesley Hall Annual General Meeting

❖ **Creche Update**

❖ **Traffick Free Chocolate**

Did you know that a child of 10 may have been trafficked to make the chocolate in your favourite Easter egg?

Over a third of the cocoa that makes the world's chocolate comes from the Cote D'Ivoire, Africa. It's highly likely that the beans that make your favourite chocolate Easter egg come from there. Cocoa harvesting is backbreaking and hazardous work. The shocking reality is that much of this work is done by children. Thousands of boys as young as 10 years old, from the Cote D'Ivoire and neighbouring

countries, are trafficked to pick and harvest these beans. Their freedom is taken and they are forced to work long hours on the cocoa plantations without receiving any money for their work. They are beaten and work in dangerous conditions.

This Easter, 'Stop the Traffick' invite you to join their petition to call on Mondelez to make a public commitment to reduce the risk of child trafficking in their cocoa supply chains. Mondelez are the largest chocolate company in the world, owning some of the top chocolate brands such as Cadbury's, Milka and Toblerone. They have the ability to make a huge difference within the chocolate industry.

Other global chocolate companies such as Mars, Ferrero and Hershey have made commitments to certify their entire chocolate range by 2020. Mondelez is lagging behind. This Easter Stop the Traffick want to ask Mondelez to set a public deadline for certifying their entire chocolate range. They want to see a third-party certification stamp (such as Fairtrade, UTZ or Rainforest Alliance) on all of their chocolate products.

This Easter show Mondelez that you care by joining a petition by going on-line to www.stopthetraffik.org and following the link to the petition. There are also resources on the website including a sample letter which you could send to your local supermarket encouraging them to stock more certified Easter Eggs.

❖ Giving A Bit

Wesley Ebenezer Methodist Church is now registered with 'giving a bit'. This is a website that allows charity supporters to generate income for their favourite charities as they shop online at **no cost to themselves**. If you would like to begin helping Wesley Hall, follow the instructions below:

1. Sign up at www.givingabit.com (it's completely free)
2. Select 'Find a charity or community'
3. Search for Wesley Ebenezer Methodist Church
4. Click 'Join this community'
5. Start generating income for Wesley Hall at **no cost to you!**

'Giving a bit' is supported by hundreds of popular online retailers such as Amazon, Argos, Boots, Debenhams, John Lewis, Sainsbury's and many more. If you are going to buy something from one of these websites, make sure you log into 'giving a bit' first, search for the retailer and then click through to their website from 'giving a bit'. Then, any purchases you make will be linked to your 'giving a bit' account and Wesley Hall will benefit. Many retailers have special offers for those who use 'giving a bit', so it is worth logging in and checking if you could save money before you make any purchases online. There is also a handy widget that you can download to quickly let you know if the website you are using supports 'giving a bit' without having to log back into the main website.

❖ Foodbank Collections

Wesley Hall is now collecting for the S6 foodbank which provides short term emergency food and support to local people in crisis. You can help by donating non-perishable food using the box in the Entrance Area. The most needed items are UHT milk, sugar, fruit juice, soup, pasta sauces, tinned sponge pudding, tinned tomatoes, cereals, tinned rice pudding, tea bags, instant coffee, rice, pasta, tinned meat, tinned fish, tinned fruit, jam, biscuits and snack bars. If you are able to add something from the list to your shopping and then donate to it the foodbank, it will make a real difference to local people in need.
